#### CONSTRUCTION OF NEW UT GARAGE PROMPTS TWO-WEEK CLOSURE ON LAKE AVENUE

Starting Wednesday, Feb. 8, Lake Avenue will be closed to through traffic between 18th and 19th streets as a contractor continues construction of a new 1,000-vehicle University of Tennessee parking garage.

The street will be closed to through commuters for two weeks, but continual access will be maintained to local businesses, including Cool Beans Bar and Grill, 1817 Lake Ave., and the Renaissance III apartments. There will be a temporary no-parking zone on Lake Avenue, which will create space for temporary two-way traffic flow that will accommodate motorists wishing to access the residences or the restaurant.

The new UT garage primarily will serve commuter students, faculty and staff, but there will be some market-rate daytime public parking. On evenings and weekends, public parking will be available on all levels of the garage for a nominal fee.

#### CUMBERLAND AVENUE MILESTONE: CONSTRUCTION OF RAISED MEDIAN TO BEGIN MONDAY, MARCH 13


By 6 a.m. Monday, March 13, contractor crews overnight will have shifted the eastbound lane of Cumberland Avenue from 22nd to 19th streets to allow construction of new raised medians to begin.

This latest development in the City's \$17 million reconstruction of Cumberland Avenue represents a milestone, by two accounts.

First, the shift to the new eastbound lane, roughly 13 feet south of the current lane, will mean commuters will be driving on the permanent roadway. That means that, as the streetscape amenities are finished on the south side of Cumberland, between 22nd and 19th streets, pedestrians and motorists will be able to envision more clearly than ever what the new Cumberland Avenue will look like.

The decorative bricks, silva cell beds for trees and landscaping, street lights and other amenities have been in place since last year on the north side.

A three-block section of the south side streetscape currently is being finished, and work on the two blocks on the south side between 19th and 17th streets is now underway. Second, the raised median being built will be an important new safety feature – creating an "island" that will help pedestrians crossing the street, while also limiting left turns by motorists to designated intersections.

The new medians will be between 3 feet and 13 feet wide (see rendering above), depending on turn lanes and Knoxville Area Transit bus infrastructure. Even though the number of traffic lanes on Cumberland has been reduced, the design is expected to reduce fender benders and improve traffic flow by eliminating blockages created by vehicles turning left across incoming traffic in the middle of the block.

"The project remains within budget and on schedule for substantial completion in August 2017," said Anne Wallace, the City's Deputy Director of Redevelopment.

"Our aim has always been to create a more attractive, safer, logistically-improved and pedestrian-friendly Cumberland Avenue Corridor. The City's investments are helping the district to continue to thrive as a residential, retail and entertainment district. To date, we've helped leverage \$190 million in new private investments."

In other developments related to the Cumberland Avenue Corridor:

- <u>Vaughn & Melton</u>, the City's consulting engineers for the reconstruction project, reminds businesses to proactively coordinate deliveries of goods with their transport companies. Similar to how businesses downtown and on Market Square operate, Cumberland businesses are encouraged to request deliveries using smaller trucks, because full-size trucks will have difficulty making turns onto Cumberland between 17th and 22nd streets. Vaughn & Melton has offered to help businesses tailor a plan for deliveries if use of a smaller truck isn't an option.
- From mid-March to mid-August, the University of Tennessee will be installing new steam lines, vaults and water hydrants on a section of Volunteer Boulevard, requiring some lane closures.
- From March 27 to March 31, a lane on Cumberland Avenue near the intersection with Philip Fulmer Way / James Agee Street will be closed while AT&T crews perform utility work.

#### CUMBERLAND AVENUE MILESTONE: CONSTRUCTION OF RAISED MEDIAN CONTINUES

Since Monday, March 13, contractor crews have shifted the eastbound lane of Cumberland Avenue from 22nd to 19th streets and set the stage for the installation of the new concrete median. The next step in the process, starting Wednesday, March 22, is laying the new concrete curb with an extruded curb machine. This will require temporary, intermittent lane closures of Cumberland while the machine lays down the new median curbs.

This is the latest development in the City's \$17 million reconstruction of Cumberland Avenue.

The concrete pours will be scheduled each day to avoid peak traffic hours and will be fully complete by 6 p.m. on Friday, March 24. Flaggers and police officers will be on site to direct traffic around the work zone. If traffic is heavier than expected, an alternate route will be designated and a detour will be implemented (see detour map).

Additionally, through traffic to points east or west of the area may want to consider using Neyland Drive as an alternate route.

The work will occur starting at 19th Street in the eastbound traffic lane.



#### ANTICIPATE PAVING ON, NEAR CUMBERLAND AVENUE THIS WEEK

As the City's 28-month \$17 million reconstruction of the Cumberland Avenue Corridor nears completion in August, contractor crews will be paving this week on Cumberland Avenue, 17th Street and 18th Street.

The paving work by Southern Constructors Inc. begins at 6 a.m. Wednesday, May 17, and will continue through Friday evening.

The last section of the eastbound lanes on Cumberland Avenue, between 19th and 16th streets, will be paved to the new subgrade in preparation for the last section of median to be installed in June. (A final paving will be done upon substantial completion of the project later this summer.) Motorists will maintain the current traffic pattern on Cumberland during this week's paving.

A section of South 18th Street, between Cumberland and an alley south of Cumberland, will be closed from 6 a.m. Wednesday until 6 p.m. Thursday. Motorists should take South 19th Street or Melrose Place as an alternate route.

From 6 a.m. Wednesday until 6 p.m. Friday, the far right northbound lane of 17th Street will be closed between Cumberland and the alley north of Cumberland while SCI crews patch the pavement.

Additional paving will be done on South 22nd and South 21st streets with flagging around the work areas when paving is underway.

The existing four-lane Cumberland between 22nd and 17th streets is being remade into a safer, more pedestrian-friendly corridor with a three-lane cross section, a raised median and left-turn lanes at intersections. An earlier phase of work on the western end of Cumberland focused on improving traffic flow between the Alcoa Highway ramps and 22nd Street; that phase finished at the end of 2015, on time and under budget.

#### CONCRETE POUR SCHEDULED FOR NEW HIGH-RISE ON CUMBERLAND AVENUE

A contractor building a privately-owned mixed-use high-rise between Cumberland and Lake avenues will be pouring concrete overnight tonight – the first in a series of night-time operations.

Continental Building Co. is scheduled to begin concrete-pouring operations at 11:30 p.m. today (Thursday, May 25) and will continue until 7 a.m. Friday, May 26, for the 1830 Cumberland project, a new eight-story building that will house 600 residents and offer street-level retail space.

Construction vehicles will enter the 1800 block of Cumberland Avenue work site from Lake Avenue, which will remain open to motorists wishing to access nearby businesses and residences. No lane closures are scheduled. (There currently is a temporary no-parking zone in that section of Lake Avenue to accommodate this project and construction of a University of Tennessee parking garage.)

As work on the 1830 Cumberland project continues into the summer, the sidewalk on the south side of the 1800 block of Cumberland Avenue is expected to be closed. At that time, pedestrians on the south side of Cumberland will be detoured across the street at an intersection to the north sidewalk to avoid that future stage of construction work.

#### CUMBERLAND AVENUE CORRIDOR PAVING SCHEDULED: TEMPORARY NO-PARKING ZONES ON SIDE STREETS

### The \$17 million Cumberland Avenue reconstruction project is drawing to a close, with the next big step starting on Sunday evening, July 23.

Milling will begin on Cumberland Avenue and a dozen side streets that connect to Cumberland in preparation for paving.

The milling and paving will be done by contract crews overnight – 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. – through Sunday, Aug. 6. Cumberland Avenue will be paved from 22nd Street to Henley Street, and side streets will be paved north of Cumberland to White Avenue and south of Cumberland to Lake Avenue.

Motorists should anticipate intermittent night-time detours, depending on where the milling and paving crews are working.

In addition, no-parking zones will be in effect on these side streets from 8PM - 6AM:

North of Cumberland to White Avenue

- · North 22nd Street;
- · North 21st Street;
- · North 20st Street;
- · North 19th Street;
- · North 18th Street; and
- 17st Street.

South of Cumberland to Lake Avenue

- South 22nd Street;
- South 21st Street;
- Mountcastle Street;
- South 19th Street;South 18th Street; and
- · Melrose Place.



#### **WELCOME UT STUDENTS!**

#### It's that time of year again!

Thousands of University of Tennessee students are making their way to Knoxville and will be moving into apartments and dormitories.

The City of Knoxville and Public Building Authority (PBA) officials welcome the students and remind them and their parents of City parking enforcement regulations that took effect July 1, 2016.

The City has installed over 1,000 parking meters, adjusting rates for on-street and City garage parking, and increasing parking enforcement. The goal is to create more turnover of on-street parking spaces in high-demand areas, which benefits merchants and restaurant owners. Meanwhile, here's a Q&A to help newcomers to Knoxville better understand the dos and don'ts on parking on City streets in the Cumberland District and in downtown:

#### QUESTION: How and where is parking enforced by the City of Knoxville near the UT campus?

ANSWER: City parking enforcement in the Cumberland District includes White and Lake avenues; Melrose Place; and Mountcastle, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st and 22nd streets. PBA has assigned four PBA officers to handle parking enforcement in the Cumberland Avenue area. PBA officers also enforce 30-minute limits for commercial vehicles only to park in designated commercial loading zones, and they also will be ticketing drivers who park vehicles illegally on sidewalks or in other non-designated areas.

QUESTION: How much does it cost to park at a metered on-street space? What are the hours of operation, when I'm subject to getting a parking ticket?

ANSWER: The rate for parking in an on-street metered space is uniformly \$1.50 an hour. Vehicles typically can be parked for up to two hours at a time

Hours of operation in the Cumberland District are 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays. (The same hours are in effect downtown, except on Gay Street and around Market Square; on those streets, enforcement hours extend til 11 p.m.)

#### QUESTION: If I'm downtown, isn't it cheaper to park in a City-owned garage?

ANSWER: The downtown City garage rate is \$1 an hour – that's 50 cents an hour less than metered on-street rates. You can park all day in the garage for \$7/day (maximum). Parking in City-owned garages will remain free on weekends and upon entry after 6 p.m. on weekdays.

#### QUESTION: If I get a parking ticket, how much would I have to pay? Can I pay it online? What if I think the ticket is undeserved and I want to talk with someone in City Court?

ANSWER: The smallest fee, for a meter violation, starts at \$11. But the penalties vary depending on the violation. Parking in a space reserved for a disabled driver, for example, is punishable by a \$50 fine.

#### QUESTION: What do I do if the Knoxville Police Department has authorized my vehicle to be towed for illegally parking in a commercial zone or a fire lane?

ANSWER: Vehicles that are towed are taken to the City's Vehicle Impoundment Lot on Vice Mayor Jack Sharp Road in East Knoxville. The contact number for the lot is 865-215-6215.

To retrieve a vehicle from the Impoundment Lot, you'll need a government-issued photo ID, a licensed driver, and proof of ownership. The Impoundment Lot is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, but vehicles are only released between 8 a.m. and midnight. Impound fees may be paid with cash, a Mastercard or VISA credit card, a debit card with a VISA emblem, a company check, a cashier's check or a money order.

#### QUESTION: I'm new to town and I see red trolley buses around downtown and near UT. Really - I can park and ride for free?

ANSWER: The City's transit service, Knoxville Area Transit, operates three free trolley routes, Mondays to Thursdays until 8 p.m. (and until 10 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays).

The Orange Line serves the UT, University Commons and World's Fair Park areas, with a trolley rolling by every 15 minutes.

The Green Line serves the Old City, Market Square and Gay Street, with a trolley rolling by every 10 minutes.

The Blue Line is KAT's Waterfront Connection, linking the Civic Coliseum parking garage to downtown and the City County Building, returning via Hill Avenue. A trolley rolls by every 7 minutes on weekdays (every 15 minutes on Saturdays), offering a direct connection on to UT campus for residents east of downtown or for parkers at the Coliseum.

#### QUESTION: I'm a parent, and I'm moving my child into student housing off Cumberland Avenue this weekend. Can I unload the vehicle and then go park somewhere?

ANSWER: There's a Fort Sanders Regional Medical Center surface parking lot at 19th Street and White Avenue, the most eastern of a series of parking lots in that block. It's available to UT parkers and the general public after 6 p.m. weeknights and on weekends. To be sure you're parking in the right place, pay attention to the posted signs on the lots – the signs will indicate if you're in the hospital's lot or a non-public tow-away lot.

# NEW TRUCK ROUTE SIGNS DIRECT TRAFFIC AWAY FROM INTERSECTION AT 17th AND CUMBERLAND

New signs installed this week direct commercial truck traffic away from the newly redesigned intersection of Cumberland Avenue and 17th Street, near the University of Tennessee campus.

To protect pedestrians at that busy intersection and avoid trucks having to make a tight turn, the signs direct trucks coming off of Interstate 40 to Dale Avenue, Western Avenue, Henley Street and then Cumberland. For drivers who miss those signs, signs along 17th Street will direct them along White Avenue to 16th Street to reach westbound Cumberland.

Signs have been added on 17th Street indicating "No Thru Trucks" and "No Right Turn Trucks" at the Cumberland intersection. Truck drivers not abiding by those signs will be subject to traffic enforcement.

#### MORE THAN 90 TREES TO BE PLANTED ALONG CUMBERLAND AVENUE

Merchants and University of Tennessee students alike have been eagerly awaiting one of the final touches of the Cumberland Avenue rejuvenation – the greening up of The Strip.

The temperatures are colder. Tree root systems are dormant. UT fall semester classes are finished. It's now the perfect time for digging holes and planting 93 big trees up and down Cumberland, between 16th and 22nd streets.

The work begins at 5 a.m. Monday, Dec. 18, and will continue around the clock through Thursday, Dec. 21.

Lane closures will be minimized during the day, and planting crews will avoid rush-hour closures. Flag crews and uniformed officers will direct traffic around the work crews. Side streets will remain open as alternate routes.

A range of species of trees was selected by the City's Urban Forestry Division – everything from round-lobed sweetgums, to lacebark elms, to sweetbay magnolias, to greenspire little leaf linden. The 4-inch caliper trees will be 15 to 20 feet tall when planted.

The tree plantings is one of the final steps in the two-year top-to-bottom reconstruction of Cumberland Avenue, which was substantially completed in August – on time and within budget.

Cumberland between 17th and 22nd streets has been transformed into a safer, more pedestrian-friendly corridor with new utility infrastructure. The sidewalks have been widened, traffic flow has been improved, and a raised median and left-turn lanes at intersections have been added.

The public investment of \$25 million in infrastructure has helped leverage more than \$190 million in private investment in retail storefronts, groceries, entertainment venues, overnight lodging, restaurants and student apartments.

Two new apartment buildings, The Standard and Evolve, have opened since 2014, and a third – the TENN Student Living mixed-use redevelopment project – is scheduled to open next year. Combined, the three properties will be home to about 1,450 students.

But at the same time that the new Cumberland has become more economically robust, it's also becoming greener – both leafier and more sustainably responsible – than ever:

- n Energy-efficient LED lights have improved the quality of the illumination along the corridor while decreasing energy consumption;
- n The new stormwater infrastructure filters trash and pollution, ensuring that run-off water reaching Third Creek is the cleanest in modern times; and
- n The widespread use of the Silva Cells a trademark product name for a box-like planter structure is a significant improvement over traditional planting methods for trees. Silva Cells provide greater soil volume, and they support the weight of the overhead sidewalk and reduce the need to compact the soil to support the sidewalk, which helps the tree roots.

"The project team wanted to create the right atmosphere along the new Cumberland Avenue," said Anne Wallace, the City's Deputy Director of Redevelopment and the Cumberland project manager.

"We envisioned a place where visitors, residents and stakeholders will want to spend quality time, with inviting, wide, shady sidewalks, places to sit, and easy transit connections. We eagerly await spring, when the new trees green up the whole corridor."
