
## BE PREPARED FOR PUBLIC TREES AND STREETSCAPES

What is a public tree? Any tree that stands on public property or within the public Right-of-way that was planted and/or maintained by the City of Knoxville. Public trees are mapped on the City of Knoxville tree inventory and can be found at www.knoxvilletn.gov/trees

### What part of a public tree is protected under City code?

- 1. Any work or maintenance on any above ground part of a public tree.
- 2. Any grade changes, work, or equipment use within the critical root zone of a public tree

What is the Critical Root Zone of a public tree? The soil area below ground and the space above ground defined by measuring one (1) foot radius away from the trunk of the tree for every inch diameter at 4.5 feet above ground.



### Permits required for work around public trees:

- All work within a public tree or in the critical root zone of a public tree requires a Public Tree Permit regardless
  of other permits issued. Permits can be fount at <a href="https://www.knoxvilletn.gov/trees">www.knoxvilletn.gov/trees</a>
- Right-of-way permits, road closure permits, development permits, and building permits still require a public tree permit if working in a public tree or critical root zone.

#### Damages to public trees may be expensive:

- Damage to public trees or the critical root zone will result in fines to repair the site or replace the entire tree if more than 20% of the tree is damaged.
- City of Knoxville codes requires inch for inch replacement for damaged trees and/or fines that equal the appraised value of the tree damaged. Damages for a single 12-inch diameter oak tree could easily amount to over \$3,000 in penalties.
